Hawaii

BIG GAME FISHING—The waters in and around the Hawaiian Islands abound with hundreds of species of game fish, large and small. Year 'round deep sea fishing, surf fishing, still fishing is available for striped Marlin, Sailfish, Tuna, Wahoo, Sharks, Mahimahi and dozens of other sporting game fish.

World's records have been broken in Hawaiian waters. Fish are plentiful, weather is favorable the year 'round, requirements are simple, making Hawaii one of the World's favorite sports fishing areas.

1951 FISHING LAWS—A brief summary of applicable 1951 laws is shown below. Check the Warden, on arrival, or the address listed below for license and other requirements for fishing in Hawaii.

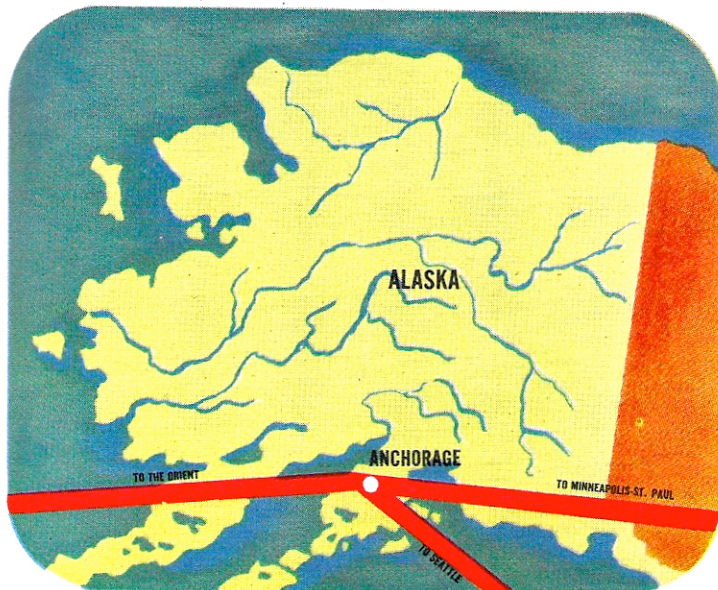

Alaska

SALT WATER FISHING—There's no closed season on rod and line fishing for giant King Salmon and Coho Salmon in salt waters of Alaska. The big Kings run nearly up to 100 pounds and the smaller fighting Cohos, as well as the Kings, abound in easily accessible Alaskan waters.

FRESH WATER FISHING—Here is truly the fisherman's paradise . . . Rainbows that average 25 inches . . . Great Northern Pike that run to tremendous size and specialize in "tackle busting,"—for real fighting sport! Graylings and Dolly Vardens by the thousands . . . literally fish at every cast in many Alaskan waters. An informal summary of current fishing laws for Alaska is shown below. Check for details on the area you plan to fish, because of varying regulations and limits.

SEASONS—Except for certain restricted areas, fishing is open year around for Rainbow, Cutthroat, Eastern Brook, Dolly Varden Trout, Steelhead, Grayling, Mackinaw, or Lake Trout.

LIMITS—In most of the Territory, 15 fish but not to exceed 15 lbs. and 1 fish daily, 1 daily bag limits in possession.

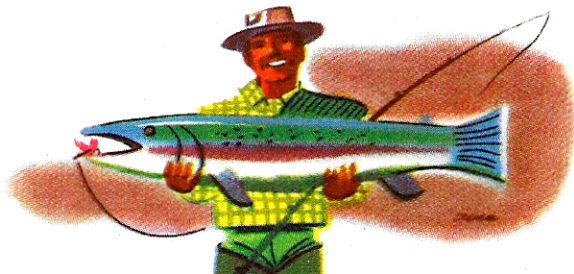

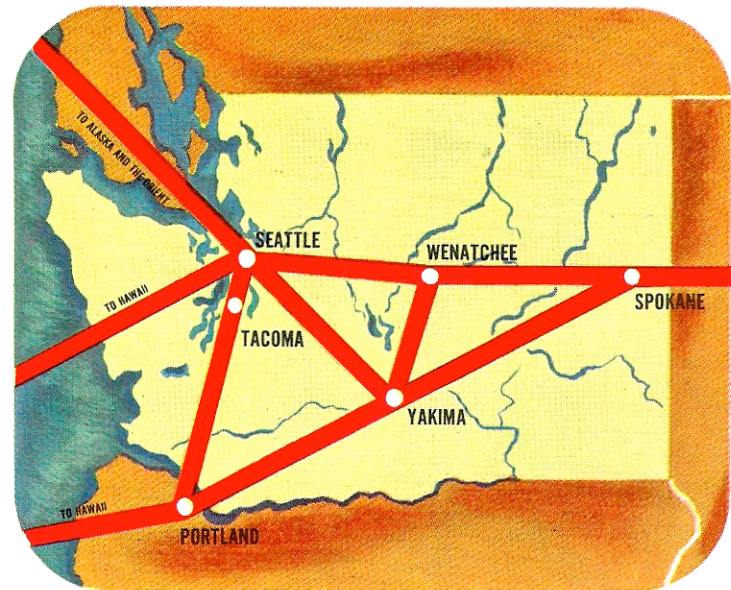

Washington

Certain waters in every county of the State of Washington are open to fishing all year around. For other waters various open seasons have been established for each county with opening dates April 15, or May 20, and seasons closing from Sept. 15 to Oct. 31.

The 1951-52 Winter Trout seasons have not been established at the time of publication of this Guide.

DAILY CATCH AND POSSESSION LIMITS—REGULAR SUMMER SEASONS: Not to exceed 10 lbs. and one game fish, but not more than 20 fish, including not more than 2 Steelhead over 20 inches long.

WEEKLY CATCH LIMIT—REGULAR SUMMER SEASON: Twice daily limits.

Excellent fishing is available for Rainbow, Cutthroat, and Eastern Brook Trout, Steelhead Trout, Silver Trout, Dolly Varden, and Salmon as well as Crappies, Sunfish, Bluegills, and Perch.

Game Fish shall be construed to mean Trout, Salmon, Grayling, Whitefish, Pike, Bass, Crappie, Sunfish, Perch, Ling, and Catfish. Trout shall include Rainbow, Steelhead, Kamloop, Cutthroat (native), Brown (Loch Leven), Mackinaw (lake), Eastern Brook, and Golden.

Season Limits: May 1 to October 31 as follows:

- Area 1—12 game fish or 14 lbs. and 1 game fish
- Area 2—20 game fish or 10 lbs. and 1 game fish
- Area 3—20 fish or 10 lbs. and 1 fish, except no more than 12 may be brown, cutthroat, or rainbow trout or largemouth bass.
- Area 4—12 game fish or 14 lbs. and 1 game fish
- Area 5—12 game fish or 14 lbs. and 1 game fish
